

My Tiger Jungle Requirements

Complete Requirement 1 plus at least two others

- 1. With your parent, guardian, or other caring adult, go for a walk outside, and pick out two or more sights or sounds of "nature" around you. Discuss.
- 2. Take a 1-foot hike. Make a list of the living things you find on your 1-foot hike. Discuss these plants or animals with your parent/guardian, other caring adult.
- 3. Point out two different kinds of birds that live in your area. With your parent/guardian, or other caring adult, find out more about one of these birds.
- 4. Be helpful to nature by planting a plant, shrub, or tree. Learn more about the needs and growth of the item you've planted.

Ideas for Adventure Requirements:

1. Use popsicle sticks and string to mark off a 1-foot square area. An area of dirt with sparse plants is better than a manicured yard. A magnifying glass will encourage Scouts to look closely for tiny movements.



- 2. Shouting out names of birds a Scout knows before going on a search will help get them thinking. Common birds might be robin, duck, goose, chickadee, blackbird, dove, hawk, pigeon, or seagull. https://tinyurl.com/Backyard-bird-sounds
- 3. Planting the tree indoors in a pot until good weather might fit your schedule better.



- 4. A birdhouse can be made from a milk carton, large food can, or pieces of wood. This is a good opportunity to try out hand tools, following plans, and painting. https://tinyurl.com/build-a-birdhouse-video
- 5. Describing sounds as 'natural' or 'human' when heard can help scouts get a feel for how wild or urban their environment is.
