Five years ago, I wrote about change in this newsletter. Back then it was about Scouting opening up to female members in Cub Scouting and Scouts BSA. Well, as the old saying goes, "The only constant in life is change."

BSA continues to change and evolve in its post-bankruptcy operations. And I suspect that change will be the norm for the foreseeable future, until the organization determines what the new normal will be. While some may feel that these changes are difficult and disruptive, I can assure you that the change is designed to ensure that Scouting remains a safe environment for our young people, our leaders and families, and that it can continue to operate in today's world for years to come.

The most recent examples of change are the elimination of prorated fees (effective August 1), and the increased focus on safety and incident reporting.

With the new fee process, youth members and adult leaders who register will now pay the full registration fee, which is good for 1 year. Prior to the member/leader's anniversary month, a reminder email will be sent to indicate that it's time to renew. Administration of this process can be done through the unit or the unit can elect to leave this to the individual member/leader/family to complete.

As we all work to implement this change, we appreciate your help, understanding, and support. Thanks for helping make Scouting a meaningful part of our young people's lives.

EAGLE SCOUT BROTHERS



ohn, Thomas, and Grant Rice Jr., triplet brothers of the Troop 859 Golden Eagles at St. Brendan the Navigator parish in Hilliard, Ohio, have been actively serving the troop, parish, and Hilliard community since crossing over from Pack 859 in 2018. All three attended Council events (including Thunderbase twice, Wrenchin' and Racin', multiple Webelos Woods, multiple Merit Badge Super Saturdays, and Aviation Merit Badge) and troop campouts, 5-6 years of summer camp, several hikes (culminating in earning Hiking merit badge), Troop cooking events, and participated in multiple service projects. All attended the 2019 World Jamboree as visitors. John,

Thomas, and Grant are very active in their faith, earning the Ad Altari Dei and being awarded the Red Sash of Merit by the Catholic Committee on Scouting for the Diocese of Columbus. In May and June 2023, John, Thomas, and Grant each earned the Eagle rank, the highest in Scouting. Each completed a project which benefitted St. Brendan the Navigator parish.

John's Eagle project consisted of clearing the overgrowth from the shadowbox fence surrounding Wellnitz Hall, repairing it and replacing 20 pickets, power washing 1,000 square feet of fence, and applying two coats of stain. He also cleared the overgrowth from the Saint

Francis shrine, powerwashing the statue and walkway.

He is currently a Junior Assistant Scoutmaster and served as a Senior Patrol Leader, Scribe, Chaplain's Aide, and Patrol Leader in the troop.

For Thomas' Eagle project, he built a shrine dedicated to St. Chabel, a Lebanese saint who impacted the world with his miracles. Thomas laid out and designed the shrine to sit in an area that felt empty to many parishiners. The shrine was erected amist three trees, selected plants, and cut sod. The shrine was raised by adding soil, adding flowers and bushes, mulch, and a concrete bases for the statue and stone bench.

He has served as Assistant Senior Patrol twice, Librarian, and Patrol Leader twice.

For Grant Jr.'s Eagle project, he replaced wooden boards and a spindle on a 40' railing, power washed it and the walkway, and applied two coats of stain to the whole railing and the underside of the wooden walkway. A fence around the HV/AC system was also power washed and received two coats of stain. Between these is the DiPetro Garden Area, where Grant powerwashed sidewalks and assembled and stained trellises for plants and two six-foot benches for seating.

He is currently a Junior Assistant Scoutmaster and served as a Troop Guide for three years, providing younger Scouts counsel, teaching them requirements, and coaching them through situations.

An extra added dimension to all three Eagle projects is that for two Saturdays, all three projects were going on at the same time at the parish, requiring these three scouts to figure out how to share tools, resources, and volunteers.

STEPS TO SUCCESSFUL RECRUITMENT





It is most effective to plan and promote a dedicated night to join your pack at your elementary school(s) associated with your pack. Avoid hosting your initial sign-up night at the location of your charter partner. If you recruit from multiple schools, a best practice is to host a separate join night at each school.

Each school typically hosts a backto-school or meet the teachers night, which is an additional opportunity to promote your pack. Be present and visible. This should be used to promote, not take the place of your standalone sign-up.

After the initial sign-up night, host multiple second chance opportunities such as an upcoming unit meeting, a service project, or a hike. You can also invite families to fall council activities such as Shoot-O-Ree or Monster Mash.



Promote your joining events in a minimum of seven ways.

Distribute flyers at schools, community organizations, and local places of

worship. Simon Kenton Council will print flyers for you at no cost.

- Put up yard signs and posters at schools, community organizations, and local places of worship.
- · Yard signs and Posters are available at our council service centers and through your district professional staff member.
- Utilize additional marketing materials such as event invitations. postcards and bookmarks. Found at the BSA Brand Center.



TROOP 7318 -THE FIRST ALL FEMALE TREK TO CONQUER THE SWAMP

he Boy Scouts of America (BSA) has long been an organization known for its dedication to character development, outdoor adventure, and leadership training. Historically, Scouts BSA programs have been predominantly maleoriented, with limited opportunities for females to participate. Since their inclusion in Scouts BSA in 2018, young women have been granted the same opportunities as their male counterparts. One remarkable milestone came with the inaugural all-female trek at BSA Swamp Base in the Atchafalaya Basin in Lafayette, Louisiana. The groundbreaking journey undertaken by these trailblazing young women and their leaders highlighted their determination, camaraderie, and the impact of their achievement on the Scouting community.

Troop 7318, based in a small town in Ohio, has always been passionate about outdoor adventures. The troop eagerly embraced the opportunity for a new challenge. Having been to the BSA's Florida Sea Base and Philmont Scout Ranch, their enthusiasm led them to set their sights on their next high adventure to Swamp Base-a

challenging five-day trek through the backwaters and swamps of Louisiana. The Scouts of Troop 7318 embarked on a 61.6 mile journey that would test their physical endurance, mental fortitude, and teamwork skills.

Undertaking the Swamp Base trek was no small feat. The trek demanded navigation through treacherous terrains, including swamps, difficult portaging through mud that was, at times, knee-high, and paddling through unpredictable weather conditions. In addition to their own

fears, the troop had to conquer these obstacles while carrying their own gear and food, cooking meals, and adhering to strict Leave No Trace principles.

In order to **Be Prepared** for this arduous adventure, the troop followed a rigorous physical training plan for several months.

Lessons were learned on this trek. **Lessons about each** other, ourselves, the swamp. Confidence and leadership emerged for each of us when it was needed most."

The journey challenged the girls physically, mentally, and emotionally. In addition to unfamiliar environmental hazards, they faced fatigue, insect bites, sunburn. The troop had to remain constantly mindful of each participant's strengths and weaknesses in order to work together to reach each destination on time. With unwavering determination, they supported and motivated one

another, fostering a strong sense of sisterhood. Through paddles as long as 20 miles in one day, floating campsites, island hammocking, and a 2:30 am wake-up to paddle to see the sunrise, each Scout and leader discovered her inner strength and resilience, pushing beyond her personal limits.

The troop enjoyed learning about the history, food, music, local indsustry, and ecology of the area and savored each opportunity to learn more. The integrated program immersed the Scouts in area culture during a wellplanned program andz, while on the water, the trek's guide was sure to offer "EduCajun" at every turn and every stop. Beautiful 1,000 year old cyprus trees, hibiscus, native fowl, and, you guessed it, LOTS of gators provided a wondrous backdrop. Returning home with a different perspective of what a swamp would be, they would use words like, "beautiful," "sacred," "peaceful," "inviting," and "spiritual,"

A LEGACY OF SERVICE AND SUPPORT CONTINUES TO SHINE.



Gary's life centered on Scouting as the former Scoutmaster of Troop 101 in Warren, former Scoutmaster and Assistant Scoutmaster of Troop 560, ordeal member of Tecumseh Order of the Arrow Lodge #56, and a member of the National Association of Eagle Scouts.

ary Mansell was a family man, business owner and passionate Eagle Scout. Gary was a mere 13 years old when he achieved the rank of Eagle at Troop 101 in Warren, Ohio. Gary went on to receive a bachelor's degree and an MBA from Youngstown State University. He started his career in business administration as an accountant for Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Ohio in Youngstown as a Medicare reimbursement supervisor. As a young man, Gary began volunteering his time with Troop 101, eventually becoming their

Scoutmaster. This began a 40-year stretch of volunteering for Scouting. Gary believed that earning the rank of Eagle mattered in every aspect of his life. He was always encouraging Scouts to reach for this outstanding achievement and to always "be prepared." He challenged his Scouts to match or beat his achievement of earning their Eagle by age 13.

Gary had an opportunity to move to Columbus and work for Nationwide Insurance in 1980. When he arrived in Central Ohio, he became Scoutmaster for Troop 560 in Westerville. His life centered on Scouting and his family.

Personally, Gary always set goals in his life. Achieving the Eagle rank by age 13 was only the first. He wanted to retire early, and he did at age 51. He wanted to design and build his dream house, and in 1997, he did. He left Nationwide to start his own nursing home company, eventually owning 11 nursing homes. During this time, he also started his own public accounting consulting company.

In 2007, we lost Gary to a sudden heart attack. He was survived by his wife, Marilyn, and daughter Sara. They started two funds to support Scouts. One called Gary's Eagles Fund and the other Gary's Eagles Scholarship Fund. Grants have been awarded through the Knox County Foundation and others for camperships and college scholarships totaling over \$40,000 since 2012. After Gary's passing, Marilyn stayed connected to Scouting and wanted to continue Gary's love of Scouting. She would host Troop 560 for camping and fishing at their 19-acre property in Delaware. Occasionally, the troop would hold their Court of Honor at their home.

This year, the Gary's Eagles Fund is supporting Simon Kenton Council Scouts through camperships for youth in Appalachian communities. Their support has helped send 17 campers to day camp and summer camp this year. We are truly grateful to be a part of Gary's shining legacy.
